Before going to Columbus, he was pastor of the First Baptist Church of Alexandria, Ind. While in Columbus, he was president of the Indiana Baptist Ministers' Council and served two years as the president of the Indiana Baptist Convention. He was elected to the General Council of the American Baptist Convention last June. His sermon topic for the Sunday morning service will be "The Plan and the Promise" and the Sunday evening topic will be "The Church For Today." Kennedy

Catholic state of the nation would spur voter registration drives and boost the U.S. senatorial campaign of Thorn Lord. And they hoped Kennedy would return at least once more before Nov. 8. At his various stops around the state, the candidate used as his theme the statement that the Eisenhower administration has let America stand still in a hurricane of worldwide political change. Kennedy never came close to his opponent, Vice President Richard M. Nixon, who was in Atlantic City for a speech. At 5 p. m., they were 70 miles apart and then both left the state. The big day for the Democrats started at 8:30 a. m. when Kennedy's 20-car motorcade entered New Jersey from New York.

120-Mile Trip From there he was whisked 120 miles with stops in Jersey City, Paramus, Paterson, Clifton, Passaic, Belleville, Newark, Elizabeth, Metuchen, Highland Park, New Brunswick, Princeton and Trenton. There was only an average turnout in heavily Democratic Jersey City—the same malady which beset Adlai Stevenson in 1956. Stevenson's trouble was that the Democratic leaders didn't go for him; one Jersey City commissioner said the lack of "home-work" yesterday seemed due to a Democratic factional dispute. The most striking feature of the drive through Jersey City was the throngs of children who lined the streets waving American flags, most of the youngsters in Catholic parochial school uniforms. Kennedy's stop at the Bergen Mall shopping center was perhaps the low point of his tour. Only some 1,500 persons were on hand and no sidewalk crowds watched as he drove through the heavily Republican area. Pick Up Crowds But things began to pick up as the caravan crossed into Passaic County, where the Democrats are now dominant. Large crowds lined the streets and a dense mass of people swarmed around Kennedy's car when he stopped at the Paterson City Hall. It was the same story, only more so, along the rest of the route. Even on main highways crowds were gathered at filling stations and roadside stores. The only drop in interest as the day wore on was in a rural and heavily Republican area of Mercer County. The largest crowd of the day, estimated at between 7,000 and 10,000, was on hand for Kennedy's last appearance of the day in front of the State House. Many of the onlookers and sign carriers waited three hours in the same spot.

Congo

(Continued) cessionist movement. Many of the soldiers at Camp Leopold are Baluba tribesmen. As a sample of the mixed up state of affairs in the Congo, Baluba tribesmen are fighting on Lumumba's side in some parts of secessionist Katanga Province. Panle-stricken by the cries for his blood, Lumumba and his own chief of staff, Gen. Victor Lundula, ducked into the officers' mess of the Ghana Brigade of the UN command, a command that he previously has demanded be withdrawn from the country. For seven hours Lumumba and Lundula covered in the mess hall while Ghana troops held off the angered Congolese. The Congo troops kept three machine guns pointed at the mess hall but let Ghana officers move in and out freely. Finally Mobutu sent his police to the rescue and Lumumba was escorted to an army truck while Congolese soldiers screamed "Koboma, koboma!" ("Kill, kill!") Screaming soldiers broke through the police cordon and lunged at Lumumba as he was pushed toward the truck. Lumumba's white sport shirt was ripped by the mob before he managed to reach the vehicle and roar off towards his home on the Congo River. Lundula decided not to go in the truck, but left by the mess hall's back door. There was no attempt to pursue him. The wild events apparently gave the Russians food for thought. "These people do not seem quite ready for their independence," said one Soviet source. Outside the camp other Congolese who once hailed Lumumba with cries of "Emeri" (Savior) now shouted for his blood. "Down with Lumumba the Communist," echoed through Leopoldville streets. (Brussels Radio said President Kasavubu had fired off a cable to UN Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld protesting that a warrant had been issued for Lumumba's arrest but UN troops were preventing his imprisonment).

Can Leader Vote? Union Beach Demo Fight Goes to Court

UNION BEACH — Richard A. Shannon, Stone Rd., has been endorsed by the Democratic Club as candidate for the one-year unexpired council term, but the question of whether his name will appear on the ballot will have to be decided by the courts. He told The Register that he has filed an action in Superior Court, through Red Bank attorney Frederick Baar, to obtain a ruling on the question. The court will set a hearing date today, Mr. Smith said. Mr. Smith said that although Democratic Club adherents offered several "compromise" candidates at the meeting, the Democratic Organization representatives "refused even to discuss a compromise," and at one point threatened to "walk out." Hanas Resignation The one-year unexpired term is the result of the resignation several months ago of former Republican Councilman Matthew J. Hanas. The GOP candidate for the post is Roy E. Mohrman. Born in Newark, Mr. Shannon has lived here five years. He has been a member of the Board of Education for the past two years, and is employed by Public Service, Irvington. He is also a member and treasurer of the local Recreation Commission. A veteran of the Korean War, he is married and has two sons.

Rezoning Of Tract Is Possible

FAIR HAVEN — A Planning Board report on the possible rezoning of the Ridge Rd. Lovett tract will be submitted to Borough Council within three months. So says Peter DeK. Dusbierre, Board of Education president. The property, owned by Lovett's Nursery, Inc., is in a residential zone. Mr. Dusbierre and other school board members have expressed concern on the effect to local schools if the tract is ever residentially developed. It is the remaining large undeveloped tract in the borough. Mr. Dusbierre has urged council to consider the possibility of placing the tract in a light industry zone. The board president said Mayor Russell H. Minton has told him the matter will be reviewed by the Planning Board with the county Planning Board and planners in Little Silver and Rumson. He said Mr. Minton figured it would take about three months to come up with the recommendation.
