As a youth Father Loeher won the American Legion "I Speak for Democracy" regional forensics meet in 1957 and received an award for outstanding achievement in debate in 1958. He received a B.A. from Sacred Heart Seminary, Detroit, in 1962 and since then has attended St. John's Provincial Seminary, Plymouth.

A year ago he received the diaconate and was assigned to parish work at St. Joseph's church, Jackson. There under the direction of Fathers Adolph M. Oser, one-time Battle Creek resident, and Darius W. Wyzynski, he taught at Jackson's citywide Bible School.

Since last October Father Loeher has served the people of St. Mary parish, Marshall, as deacon assistant to Father Elmer Grogan, and after Father Grogan's death, to Father Robert G. Bradra, administrator.
